## THE PAYNESVILLE CLASSIC BOAT RALLY 2024

The 2024 Classic Boat Rally took place at Paynesville from March 1st to March 3<sup>rd</sup>. It is a biennual event, but last conducted in 2020, as due to Covid 19 restrictions the rally scheduled for 2022 was cancelled.

The festival is free and took place along the beautiful Paynesville waterfront, a perfect location. It brought over 200 boats together, both ashore and afloat, many coming from interstate including Tasmania. Officially, only vessels over 25 years of age were eligible for entry but younger boats with classic lines were also included.



There were seminars, demonstrations, trade displays, boat building displays, music, and more. Boats ashore included trailerable yachts (this correspondent had his restored Boomerang 20 on display), sailing and rowing dinghies, catamarans, canoes, motorboats, and steam launches, etc. Numerous refreshment stalls were set up in the Gippsland Lakes Yacht Club yard.

Following the entrant's Welcome and Meet and Greet held in the GLYC rooms on the Friday evening, the event swung into full action with the Power Boat Parade along McMillan Straits on Saturday. In cloudy conditions and a cool wind well over a hundred vessels cruised past the spectators crowding the jetties and pontoons of the strait. A public announcer provided brief details of most vessels as they motored along. All the little ships created a great spectacle with each vessel in immaculate condition. Additionally, the onshore displays provided much interest; Paynesville township was "jumping"!



The Parade of Sail through McMillan Straits planned for the Sunday was sadly cancelled due to strong south westerly winds although a few brave souls did venture out, providing much excitement among the rally spectators. This correspondent found relief from the wind in attending a very informative lecture regarding the Gippsland Lakes Burranan Dolphins.

This dolphin species is found only in Gippsland Lakes, Port Phillip and Tasmanian waters. There is some travelling of these dolphins between the Gippsland Lakes and the Tasmanian group. They came to inhabit the Lakes on a permanent basis following the construction of the lakes entrance. Over the years the population has waxed and waned, extended periods of freshwater inflow from the rivers reduces lake water salinity. This causes severe lesions on the dolphin's skin and leads to mortalities. At this time the depleted population may slowly increase as there is recovery from recent flood events.

An interesting fact gleaned was that hydrophones are used to locate the dolphin's whereabouts and hydrophone recordings were played during the lecture. This correspondent can confirm the crackling sound heard when in the cabins of boats on the lakes are Snapping Shrimp. Their large claw is virtually spring loaded, and the rapid closing of the claw stuns prey! A recording played when lake salinity was low was devoid of this sound.



The event wound up on the Sunday afternoon following presentations for best restored craft, greatest distance travelled to attend, etc. In summary, full descriptions of all to see and do at this wonderful festival would take up pages but the best part of the event is the dedication and craftsmanship on display and the appreciation of the vessels shown by the rally visitors. Interestingly, BTYC Commodore Joan fell in love with an amateur built 22 foot motor launch!

Start polishing your trailable yacht, here's to the next bigger and better rally in February 2026!

What can I say. We wanted to see the High Country in autumn colour, and what a show we had. It was magnificent. With great weather and autumn colour out of this world, much fun was had by all. The group enjoyed campfires nightly with dinners cooked together some nights. ## VOLUNTEERING TO PROTECT AUSSIE WILDLIFE

While in outback Queensland in 2013, Gaye and I spent a few days at Currawinya National Park. This is home to the Bilby fence and the 25 km<sup>2</sup> feral free enclosure constructed by the Save the Bilby Fund. The project rose to national prominence in 2002 to protect the last remaining colony of wild Bilbies in this part of Australia, after the Queensland government failed to do so.

The initial success of the project, with up to 300 bilbies detected in annual population survey., had been well documented. You can imagine the disappointment when the Park Ranger at Curranwinya told Gaye and me that the recent 2012 survey failed to detect any Bilbies within the enclosure. It seems that the 2011 floods washed out a couple of sections of fence and feral cats got in. They were still in there somewhere.

When we got home I contacted a few of my former work colleagues from the Victorian Department of Agriculture and conveyed this story to them. They were equally disappointed but we resolved to do something about it. What followed was about 12 months of negotiation and a little bit of obfuscation. But in 2014 an intrepid band of 4 volunteers decamped from West Gippsland to Currawinya for about 2 weeks and systematically surveyed and repaired the errant sections of the fence around the Bilby enclosure.

We went again another 2 weeks the following year.

Currawinya doesn't need us anymore. The Queensland government has finally taken a much stronger interest in funding this Project and there is a thriving population of Bilbies at Currawinya. You may have seen media releases about the success. But our group of volunteers continues to operate (it has now expanded to about 12 individuals). In groups of four we currently spend a couple of weeks each year at Scotia Wildlife Sanctuary in outback NSW where we are trying arrest some serious habitat decline due to invasive weeds.

Volunteering to protect Aussie wildlife is almost as satisfying as sailing.
